

I hope as this first edition goes out it will encourage more people to share but more importantly, to keep in touch with us here on the Hill.



History of the Hill and Beyond




We have records of School magazines from as early as 1914. The first few editions we hold in our archive are handwritten by CEB Young. These and others are available to view on the Alumni section of our website at www.kinghamhill.org. wk/alumni/archive. An extract from the first edition includes a message from the Warden which is still very relevant today (the bit about Hillians disappearing)!

"Congratulations to those Old Boys who have made the effort to produce a more attractive and informative magazine, "The Hill and Beyond". Anything that is done by the Old Boys' Association to keep Old Boys in touch with the school and one another, deserves our support. A strong Old Boys' Association is something that every school should have and particularly our own. It is always sad when a boy who has been here for five or six years, or even more, simply seems to disappear and little or nothing is heard about him again."


For decades the School magazine included an 'Old Boys' section for news of Hillians. Then in 1965, the K.H.O.B.A (Kingham Hill Old Boys Association) introduced 'The Hill and Beyond' as a dedicated magazine for alumni. We recently spoke to Bill Mayes (Sheffield, 1945-1951) who was its editor and he is delighted that we are starting again.





After two years without public examinations, this year pupils, parents and teachers had all been awaiting results with an extra degree of trepidation. We were delighted to report that this year's leavers secured an excellent set of results, with over a quarter of A level grades awarded at A* or equivalent. Our GCSE pupils also acheieved an excellent set of results. Well over half the grades awarded were 7-9, and nearly a quarter (23%) of pupils achieved 7 or above in all their subjects.





The Kingham Hill Crest







From blazers to swimsuits, school bags to sports kit, the Kingham Hill Crest can be seen everywhere - but do you know the history behind the design?

Following a recent Hillian Committee meeting, Nanci Austin interviewed Hillian Simon Briggs (1946-55) (botttom, left) about the origin of the Kingham Hill logo.

Simon confirmed the logo was designed in late 1937....and we can confirm the findings in a letter from the Warden in a Hill magazine from that year. Simon explained that the cross in the centre of the logo is the Christian heart of the school. The hammer and book represent industry and education; the wreath sportsmanship, and holding it all together at the top is the crown - unity. The pale blue and dark blue colours represent Oxford and Cambridge University, perhaps suggesting they are goals to which pupils should aspire.

It certainly helps when looking at the logo, to know of its history and the true meaning behind it allowing pupils today to wear the crest proudly on their uniform today!.

Warden's Letter.

THE cover of our Magazine bears for the first time the new badge and motto, which have been approved by the Trustees. The thoughts and efforts of many, both boys and masters, have contributed to the design, centred round an idea which for the past two years has been growing in our minds; and we are grateful to the Somerset Herald, and to his colleagues at the College of Arms, for their skill and pains in producing the final form. But in the very writing of these last words we realised that the final form is not yet cast; the "completeness" which we seek here is still to be worked out, and must ever lie ahead.

For the true device by which the Hill will be known in years to come—as in the past—may be discerned, not printed on paper, but graven in individual hearts, and woven into the fabric of our common life; and against the golden background of all the happiness of this place, the Cross of Christ must stand central and foremost, symbol of that divine "charity, which is the bond of perfectness," and in which all our manifold activities may rightly find their inspiration. "Ye, being many, are one Body in Christ": let each member perform his due part, that the life of Kingham Hill may be worthy of our inheritance, and that we "may grow up into Him in all things, Which is the Head, even Christ."

Improvements on The Hill







Many major improvements have happened on The Hill over the last decade. A new science and maths building, new library, new sports hall and performing arts space (converted from the old sports hall). Along the way, there have been smaller projects that have really added to the life of the school - one of the favourites with pupils and staff is the outdoor classroom behind Severn and Greenwich (see next page). A Kingham Hill Chronology

In previous alumni magazines there used to be a section referring key events in the history of the school. With that in mind, we've started it again from the very beginning. To view a video of early years of CEB Young and the founding of KHS visit www.youtube.com/watch?v=AlpD8R6x8ls.

- 1850 19th March. The birth of Charles Edward Baring Young, son of Charles Baring Young
- 185? Attended Blackheath Secondary School as a boarder.
- 1862 Charles Baring Young bought Oak Hill Mansion in Southgate, North London.
- 1863 Charles Edward Baring Young at Eton College.
- 1868 CEB Young sent to Trinity College, Cambridge, to study the Classical Tripos.
- 1872 Awarded Bachelor of Arts degree.
- Awarded the Master of Arts degree. He was now called to the bar, but there is no record of his practising as a barrister. He joined the committee of The Homes for Working Boys in London, an organisation then engaged in opening its fourth Home.
- Death of Charles Baring Young. Charles Edward inherited the bulk of his estate.
- 1883 29th September. C.E.B. Young purchased the Daylesford Estate, which included Kingham Hill Farm, at the top of the hill, from Robert Nicholl Byass. Building work began immediately.
- November. C.E.B. Young was elected Conservative Member of Parliament for Christchurch.
- 14th September. Durham House opened. The Founder had a great deal of say in the plans, and personally chose the names for all the houses after a great deal of thought. The architect of Kingham Hill was Mr Howard Seth-Smith, subsequently President of the Architectural Association 1900-02; Mr R. Wiggall was Clerk of the Works, and the carpenter was Mr G. Lamb. There was no contractor, as the Founder directly employed local craftsmen. On this day the first boy, Walter Balfour, arrived. The first Superintendent and Matron of Durham House were Mr and Mrs A Hamerton.

C.E.B. Young re-elected to Parliament.

22nd December. There were now twelve boys in Durham House.

Recent Visits to the School

Stratford House Reunion

Back in 1981, Mr (James) Woolliams and his wife had a teaching exchange with Jane and Ian Bentley from a school in Australia. On a sunny day in July, 40 years later, the Bentleys returned to the Hill and met with friends from their time at Kingham for a mini reunion.

Jane and Ian Bentley arrived at Kingham in December 1981 with two small children - in the middle of a blizzard - from Melbourne. They lived at Stratford House (in teachers village) along with the bachelor teaching staff and very quickly became a huge part of life on the Hill. They have kept in touch with their former colleagues over the years and wanted to visit Kingham on their trip to the UK this past summer.

Roy Mylan (Science and Bradford Tutor), Andrew Sinclair (English and Durham Tutor), Adrian Lloyd (PE and Greenwich Houseparent) & Godfrey Nicholson (Maths) were all in attendance, as were Liz and Robert Herringshaw (Bradford) and David and Gerti Shepherd. Guy Roberts (son of Norwich Houseparents and also a Hillian from 1981-88) and Tim Foster (Bradford 1979-85) also joined their former teachers and enjoyed the day. Celebrations were based at the recently refurbished cricket pavillion.

In July, the daughter of William G Lane visited from Canada. William attended the school from 1914-1926 and was just 5 years old when he joined. William's father (who had fought in the Boer war), died when William was 4 and his mother was left with 3 children in South Africa from where they set sail for England aboard a cargo ship on Christmas Day. Williams' admission to the school enabled him to grow up in a safe and a stable community. As a Founder's Pupil, William had the opportunity to later move to Havelock Farm in Canada and begin a new life. He went on to serve his adopted country in the Second World War and earned the Military Medal for 'bravery and courage'. It was an emotional visit for Virginia who wrote:

'It was a very special and powerful experience for me to wander through the various rooms of Sheffield House,

knowing that this was one of the homes where my dad grew up. Ironically, seeing a quote on the whiteboard in the hallway of Sheffield was powerful for me as that quote from Socrates - 'The unexamined life is not worth living', has been a mantra for me for most of my adult life.'

William was, like so many boys from his time, the reason that Charles Baring Young built Kingham Hill. Virginia commented that during her childhood, her dad often commented on how grateful he was to Kingham Hill School, for not only the education he received, but also for the opportunity to begin a new life in a new country.' That is still very much at the heart of what we would like to achieve at Kingham Hill and this is achieved through our Founder's Pupils programme. moved to discover a photograph hanging on a board in the entrance to Top School. That photo is of boys in the library with the old globe (above) and one of those boys is Chris' father, Dennis. Chris also remembers his father speaking fondly of the grounds and in particular the swimming pool,






Old Boys Return after 60 years
